

Educational research has suggested many strategies that can be used to enhance the effectiveness of teaching and learning. All the adults who live and work with children are incredibly significant because they form part of their world. We as adults are shaping their character, forming their belief systems and affecting the quality of their life.

The support by adults provides children with security and skills to succeed in school and in the world at large.

Pushing oneself through daily training drills to build expertise needs dogged faith in oneself and steely fortitude to achieve mastery. Not all students who participated won a medal but all of them learned life skills that shapes winners. In the words of a gritty student who didn't make the cut at the Athletic Meet, "I'll practise every day. I know I'll get faster!"

This is the spirit I would like all of us to celebrate. Parents, please play with your children. Allow them to lose and struggle as they process and deal with their emotions. Guide them through what researchers call 'Productive Struggle.' Family time has become such a precious commodity and so I sincerely urge you to create the space for you to interact over a board game, a trek, a nature walk or just a picnic at Cubbon Park.

The singular motivation to launch 'ESPRIT DE CORPS' was to increase field time and reduce screen time. One of our banes in today's world is the addiction, across age groups, to laptops and gadgets. This causes undue stress on the eyes and even causes sleep deficiency and fatigue. A better world is one in which we work, learn, play outdoor games and fall asleep feeling beautifully tired.

# From the Principal's Desk To Change or Not To Change



Change is the only constant in life. This quote is attributed to the Greek philosopher Heraclitus (540-480 BCE). A paradox by itself, the thought, nevertheless, reminds us that nothing in life remains the same forever. And that everything is in a state of flux. George Bernard Shaw echoed these sentiments when he said, "Progress is impossible without change and those who cannot change their minds cannot change anything." Unless we change with the changing times, we could be left behind in this race called life.

The pace of change in the 21st century is swift, almost meteoric and all of us, in different ways, depending on the generation we belong to, are trying our best to stay ahead of the game by adapting to the breakneck speed with which changes are happening around us.

Yet, ironically, the more things change the more they remain the same.

Martin Luther King Junior, the prominent US civil rights activist who was deeply influenced by Mahatma Gandhi's ideals of non-violence, is considered by many as one of the greatest orators the world has ever seen. 6 months before he was assassinated, King addressed a group of high school students, way back in 1967, where he spoke about the importance of having a 'solid and sound blueprint for life'. The blueprint that he shared with them is as relevant today as it was then. While delving into the entire speech by Martin Luther King would be cumbersome, I would like to revisit a few of his timeless words. He exhorts the young audience, "It isn't by size that you win or fail. Be a bush if you can't be a tree, just be a trail if you can't be a highway, be a star, if you can't be the sun, just be the best of whatever you are." And he ends with the words, "If you can't fly, run, if you can't run, walk, if you can't walk, crawl, by all means keep going." These words of Martin Luther King, spoken 57 years ago are as relevant today as it was then. As I mentioned earlier, the more things change the more they remain the same...

Similarly, Admiral William H. McRaven, while addressing the graduates of the UT Austin, class of 2014, shared with them important lessons of life learnt during his Basic Navy Seal training.(https://news.utexas.edu/2014/05/16/mcraven-urges-graduates-to-find-courage-to-change-the-world/) I would like to focus on five of his lessons here.

The first lesson: Make your bed first thing in the morning.

Little tasks done well and done with sincerity can also give you an immense sense of achievement and pride and propel you to do bigger things. If you can't do the little things in life right, you will never be able to tackle the big things well.

The second lesson: Everyone must paddle together.

No one can accomplish something worth achieving all by themselves. To make it big we will need the help of others, our parents, siblings, other family members, friends, coworkers and sometimes "even the good will of complete strangers". There will always be someone to whom we owe our gratitude in our heady moment of success.

The third lesson: Respect everyone. Measure a person by the size of his heart... not by the size of his flippers.

The point he makes here is simple. Never judge anyone by their appearance, accept people as they are, treat everyone with respect, be compassionate, empathetic, sensitive and inclusive and make a difference in the lives of those who are not as fortunate as we are.

The fourth lesson: Don't be afraid to fail; have the courage to take risks and think differently.

Life can be unfair. No matter how well we prepare or perform, we still might not make it. So, when we fail, and we will time and time again, we must gather the courage to just pick ourselves up and move forward. And, to leave our footprints on the sands of time we will have to think and do things differently. There are no two ways about it.

And the final Lesson: Don't Ring the Bell.

Basic Navy SEAL training is rigorous, almost torturous and carried out in an environment of constant stress. There is a brass bell in the center of the compound and all that the trainee has to do to quit midway is to ring the bell.

So, don't ring the bell means don't ever quit, no matter how tough the going is. It may be clichéd, but it is true. Winners never quit and quitters never win!

The above lessons will stand the test of time. Generations may go by, but their relevance will never diminish. Change may be the only constant in life, but some things will always remain constant. They never change.



Diya Agrawal (Grade 12) placed 4th in India in the Asia-Pacific Linguistics Olympiad (APLO) held in April 2023. Diya represented India at the International Linguistics Olympiad (IOL) held in Bulgaria. She also achieved phenomenal success by scoring a near-to-perfect score of 116.25 in the fiercely competitive AILET (All India Law Entrance Test) exam in December 2023 and clinched All India Rank 1. AILET is a national-level entrance exam conducted by the National Law University Delhi (NLU-D) every year for admission to their 5-year B.A.LL.B.(Hons.) programme.














## HACKATHON







# WILDLIFE TALK for Grades 4 & 5

On the 4th of December 2023, students had Mr. Shuayb Ahmed who is a wildlife rescuer, enthusiast and conservationist, in their midst. He introduced the ways in which students can contribute to wildlife conservation.

Students intently listened as Mr. Shuayb elaborated on the harm that one can cause knowingly or unknowingly to the wildlife and birds in the neighbourhood. He conveyed to the students the risk of manjha used in kites that is the major contributor of fatality in birds. This was followed by an engaging session on the big four venomous snakes, the patterns on their skin and other non-venomous snakes that anyone can come across in their lifetime. He also spoke about ways to avoid snake bites and measures to be taken when someone gets bitten by a snake. Students clarified their doubts during a short, interactive, question hour.

The wildlife expert shared few of his personal experiences that was very captivating for the audience. At the end of the session, students pledged to conserve wildlife in their own, little ways. The thoughts about wildlife and its conservation has now become deep seated in their minds and hearts.

# INTER-CLASS Competitions

We at NPSKRM believe that these competitions help in enhancing students' proficiency in academics and at the same time help the students develop important life skills like confidence, socialization, stage presence, time management and organizational skills. These Inter-Class Competitions were spread over a period of 5 months; from August to December. The preliminary round of the competitions gave every child an opportunity to participate in the event of their choice, while the selected students competed with each other in the final round. The winners were felicitated with a certificate in the month of January.


The session also emphasized that teachers shoulder a great responsibility in making the students aware of all these threats and educating them on how to prevent many of these threats by being extra careful.

## The Ethics of Ghostwriting

By definition, a ghostwriter is a person hired to write literary or journalistic works, speeches or other texts that are credited to another person as the author. Examples of ghostwritten books include- The Nancy Drew series, which was originally created by publisher Edward Stratemeyer and was ghostwritten by various authors under the name Carolyn Keene. The "Goosebumps" series is credited to R L Stein but he too had a team of ghostwriters who created books in the series. Celebrity memoirs are also a perfect example of the same, most books are marketed and advertised as written by the celebrity, but if you look at the fine print you will see that an underground author is credited for "bringing it to life".

However, there is a difference between ghostwriting and co-authoring. A co-author is usually an active contributor to the body of work while a ghostwriter translates someone's ideas/experiences into a book, and is the person actually writing the book.

Though it seems flat out unfair that the advertised author gets all the glory, while no one recognizes the name of the ghostwriter, that is the job they signed up for. Authors ghostwrite for a number of reasons, be it for experimenting with genres without impacting their author name or just because they don't want their name all over the internet. While it is legal, something about it doesn't feel ethical.

To be blunt, ghostwriting feels like glorified (but consented) plagiarism. From the standpoint of a consumer, when I buy a book, I will associate the ideas and the writing style to the name in big font on the cover, not to the name in the acknowledgements. People argue that since the ghostwriter uses the author's ideas, the outcome of the book is just as it would've been if the author had the expertise and patience to master the craft and write it themselves.

At the end of the day, ghostwriting is admittedly, also its own respectable art where the authors convert abstract ideas into well written books, putting their clients' preferences over their creative process.

## The Psychology of Deindividuation

Deindividuation is the loss of identity or self-awareness, usually in a group setting. It is defined as a psychological state of decreased self-evaluation and decreased evaluation apprehension causing antinormative and disinhibited behavior. Usually, we, as humans, have our own unique identity and distinct opinions. We behave and make judgments in accordance with our moral compass, which guides us through forks in the road. But sometimes, we get swept up by a group and do things that we never would have done otherwise, such as looting, rioting, or even bullying. Our own critical thinking is suppressed and our identity in the group overrides our individual sense of self. This loss of self constraint occurs when group members feel anonymous and aroused, and it leads to what is known as mob mentality. Deindividuation can arise out of phenomena such as groupthink, conformity, and peer pressure and can be rampant in teens: fuelled by their inherent lack of judgment and recklessness.

Groupthink is the tendency for some groups to make bad decisions due to group members suppressing their reservations and dissent, resulting in a false unanimity. Groupthink paired with group polarization, the tendency of a group to make more extreme decisions than the group members would make individually, is a disastrous combination that can quickly lead to violence. Group settings strip us of any accountability and leave us feeling invincible, something that should be prevented at all costs especially in a hormonal teenager. There have been multiple studies performed that show this phenomenon of deindividuation. One such experiment was carried out by Philip Zimbardo. In his prison experiment, he assigned a group of Stanford students with no abnormal personality traits to play either the role of a prison guard or a prisoner. They were all fitted into their uniforms, prisoners

#### Right to be Forgotten

#### Right to be Forgotten:

It is the right to have publicly available personal information removed from the internet, search, databases, websites, or any other public platforms, once the personal information in question is no longer necessary, or relevant.

The RTBF gained importance after the 2014 decision of the Court of Justice of the European Union ("CJEU") in the Google Spain case. In the Indian context, the RTBF emerges from the right to privacy under Article 21 and partly from the right to dignity under Article 21.

Today, at this point it is not simple to get away from one's past when one's personal information can be easily circulated around the web or stay on the internet endlessly, accessible through speedy search results. For people who wish to start afresh, the right to be forgotten remains important and even more necessary given the expand of our digital footprint. An essential that query encompasses commencement and nature of the right to be forgotten is: would it be a good idea for us to reserve the right to be forgotten?

In India, the first question previously came up before the judiciary in Dharamraj Bhanushankar Dave v. State of Gujarat, before the Gujarat High Court. In its judgment the court did not acknowledge the so-called "right to be forgotten." Here, in this case the petitioner had been charged with criminal conspiracy, murder, and kidnapping, among others and was acquitted by the Sessions Court, which was further supported by a Division Bench of the Gujarat High Court. The petitioner had claimed that since the judgment was non-reportable, respondent should be banned from publishing it on the internet because it would jeopardise the petitioner's personal and professional life. The High Court, on the other hand, found that such publication did not violate Article 21 of the Indian Constitution, and that the petitioner had presented no legal basis to prevent the respondents from publishing the judgment. In a case under the Madras high court, the petitioner's name continued to appear in the High Court's verdict and was freely available to anyone who would type their name into Google search. Even though the petitioner was acquitted, they were named as an accused throughout the preceding judgment.

Therefore, the petitioner contends that this has a negative influence on his public image. As a result, the petitioner requests the High Court to issue an order redacting their name from the verdict. The Parliament and the Supreme Court should engage in a detailed analysis of RTBF and evolve a mechanism for balancing the conflicting rights of privacy and freedom of expression. In this digital age, data is a valuable resource that should not be left unregulated. In this context, the time is ripe for India to have a robust data protection regime.

L'abbaye du Mont-Saint- Michel a gagné en renommée en tant que lieu d'apprentissage, attirant certains des plus grands intellectuels et collectionneurs de manuscrits d'Europe.

Comment visiter le Mont Saint-Michel ? Pour préserver le paysage exceptionnel du Mont-Saint-Michel, les parkings visiteurs ont été déplacés plus à l'intérieur des terres. Le mont est situé à environ 2,4 km des parkings. Une fois garé, vous devez vous diriger vers la place des Navettes, où des passeurs, des navettes spécialement conçues pour vous amener au mont. La navette se trouve à 800 mètres des parkings et les promeneurs s'arrêtent à 450 mètres du mont. Les passeurs travaillent quotidiennement à intervalles réguliers entre 7h30 et minuit. Le Mont Saint-Michel est l'un des sites les plus inoubliables d'Europe, situé dans une baie envoûtante partagée par la Normandie et la Bretagne.



#### The Mean World Syndrome

After several attempts to send visual signals across long distances for years, in 1927, Herbert A Ives and Frank Gray of Bell Laboratories created something where the moving images were clearer than just silhouettes, and could travel long distances to devices miles away. Our beloved TV was born.

And for a few years now, TV show producers and directors, and animators, have been doling out series after series and we are lapping it all up for years for several hours a day!

How does it influence us?

Well, one television journalist, a content-researcher, was interested. In 1960s, Hungarian born American Professor of University of Pennsylvania, Prof. George Gerbner, developed *Cultivation Theory* to seek out lasting influence that TV may have on viewers.

He discovered that people who spent more time watching television are more likely to perceive the real world in a way as depicted in television messages!


The theory states that the more time people spend *living* in the television world, the more likely they are to *believe* Social Reality aligns with reality portrayed on Television.

Scientists around the world also conducted studies to show that people who binge-watched series that involve destruction, like fire, killing, abusive language etc., showed *Mean World Syndrome* (MWS).

Mean World Syndrome means that people *perceived world* to be more dangerous than it actually is.

They also suffered from FOMO, the need to remain in 'excited state', and a desire to *escape* from reality...


Ultimately, all these experiences became learnings for the students, and the school, and we moved ahead stronger than before

#### **Learning after School-My Journey?**




