



Part 1 — Echoes of Time transported the audience across different eras, beginning with the Palaeolithic period, where Grade 1 depicted the lives of early tribes and their discoveries such as fire and weapons. Grade 2 showcased the transition from nomadic life to settled communities, highlighting the birth of trade, currency, and social order. Grade 3 brought to life the remarkable urban planning and vibrant culture of the Indus Valley Civilisation, particularly *Mohenjo-daro*.

Through a harmonious blend of dance, drama, and mime, students vividly portrayed humanity's journey through time. The narrative was beautifully woven together by the central characters — *Time*, a monk, and his disciples — who guided the audience seamlessly through each epoch.

Grade 3 brought to life the remarkable progression from early humans to the flourishing Indus Valley Civilisation. Their presentation highlighted advanced town planning, skilled craftsmanship, trade practices, and the cultural richness of the era. Through a lively Hindi skit and a series of expressive dances and dramatised sequences, students showcased how early settlements gradually evolved into one of the world's earliest well-organided civilisations.

The culmination of the showcase revolved around a powerful message from Time—a heartfelt call to future generations to safeguard the planet.

Through narration, visuals, and performance, students reminded the audience that nature's gifts are finite and fragile, and that every action taken today will echo into tomorrow. The segment urged everyone to adopt mindful habits, protect ecosystems, and preserve the resources we are privileged to use. It beautifully reinforced the idea that Earth is not something we inherit from our ancestors, but something we borrow from the generations yet to come—and therefore must return with care, respect, and responsibility.

Vasundhara Part 2 – Dawn of a New Age

Vasundhara - Part 2 – Dawn of a New Age, opened with the later Vedic period and the Gurukul system, tracing the evolution of knowledge, defence, and warfare. The segment featured the rise of ancient martial traditions with a powerful display of *Mallayuddha* and *Dhanurveda*. The narrative then explored the darker side of human ambition through a striking portrayal of the bombing of Hiroshima, followed by the rise of the phoenix — a symbol of hope and resilience.



Grade 4 opened with the dawn of the Vedic period, seamlessly continuing the storyline introduced by Grades 1, 2, and 3. Guided by Time as the central narrator, a monk and his disciple journeyed across eras, eventually reaching the present day. After exploring the Vedic age, the performance highlighted the rise of defence as a vital means of safeguarding kingdoms. This segment was brought to life through an engaging Kannada skit and a dynamic dance drama that showcased *Dhanurvidhya*, an ancient martial tradition considered a predecessor of the Kalari martial art form.
